Fight against Animal Cruelty

Animal cruelty is not only wrong—it is against the law in every state in this country! Animal abuse can also be part of a pattern of other violent acts within families and society. Abuse of any kind should be reported to the appropriate authorities

Tips for Reporting Animal Cruelty

Once you have found out which law enforcement agent you should speak to, it's important to provide him or her with a concise, written, factual statement of what you observed, giving dates and approximate times whenever possible. If at all feasible, try to photograph the abusive situation and date your pictures. It would also be helpful to get short, factual written statements from other witnesses.

When you call to report animal cruelty, always make sure to keep a careful record of exactly whom you contact, the date of the contacts and the content and outcome of your discussion. Never give away a document without making a copy for your file! Make it clear to the agent that you are very interested in pursuing the case, and that you

Thank you for making pet adoption your first option. Whether you're here to scout out the awesome available animals at the ASPCA, find a shelter in your area or learn more about adopting a pet, you've come to the right place!

Preparing Your Home for Your New Pet

- * Put a cozy bed for your pet in every room. Pets are much more likely to keep off of furniture if they have attractive alternatives.
- * Until your pet learns house rules, don't give him unsupervised access to rooms with sofas, beds or any other furniture you don't want him on. Instead, spend time with your pet in those rooms, and be ready to gently but persistently discourage him from jumping up on the furniture. It may help to leave a short leash on your dog if he tries to hop up on your sofa. The moment he does, say "Oops!" Then take hold of his leash and gently lead him away from the sofa.
- * During "chill time" together, teach your dog that you'd like him to hang out on his own bed rather than on your furniture. Tie a short tether (about four feet in length) to the leg of a sofa. Place your dog's bed next to the tether. When you're ready to sit back and relax, tether your dog and give him something exciting to chew. (Try a new bully stick, rawhide or stuffed Kong toy.) While he works on his treat, you can sit on the sofa and read a book or watch TV.
- * If you have a cat, try putting double-sided sticky tape or upside-down carpet runner on furniture to discourage Fluffy from scratching.

For over 140 years the ASPCA has worked tirelessly to end animal cruelty. From education and care to adoption and rescue, the ASPCA is making a life changing difference for animals across America. For 60 cents a day, you will support ASPCA Meet Your Match! MYM is the only method in existence today that evaluates an animal's behavior and interests and matches them to an adopter's preferences so that you take home a pet you can really click with.

The Disaster Response team is a specially trained 12-person group that assists man-made and natural disasters. This team maintains two 20-plus foot trailers, stocked with animal rescue equipment, computers and radios, veterinary supplies and kennels that can be deployed at any time to any part of the country.

The ASPCA's Mobile Clinic & Outreach program provides free and low-cost spay/neuter and vaccination services to pets in underserved communities. In 2008, the Mobile Clinic Program spayed and neutered over 23,220 animals—a 63% increase over 2007, thereby impacting the problem of unwanted offspring and pet homelessness.
